General Rules and Regulations

1. All entries are made subjected to the General Rules and Regulations of the RAWF. All Exhibitors are bound by them.
2. Every exhibitor in the regular classes must be a grower, and the product exhibited by him/her must have been grown in the country in which the exhibitor resides.
3. Not more than one entry in any class will be accepted from one individual.
4. Exhibits must be delivered (door #33 unless otherwise stated below) or shipped (prepaid) to: **Agriculture Show Office**

 - a. Potatoes will be received after 8:00 a.m., Monday, October 31 and before 3:00 p.m., Tuesday, November 1.
 - b. Other vegetables must be received on or before Tuesday, November 1, 8:00 p.m.** Exhibitors with entries in more than one Section are permitted to bring all entries to the Royal on Tuesday, November 1, by 6:00pm. Giant Vegetable entries, section 829, will be accepted from Saturday Oct. 29 – Tuesday Nov. 1 at Door #44. The entries will be kept in a secure location by RAWF staff. Entries not in classes 3, 11, 13, 17, and 22 can be delivered to the fair between 9:00 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. on Saturday November 5 at loading dock #20 located at the east loading docks off Manitoba Drive.
*** If you are delivering your entries, allow enough time for traffic, etc. Your entries must be at the assigned area before the deadline. **ALL EXHIBITS MUST ARRIVE ONE HOUR PRIOR TO JUDGING TIME. LATE ENTRIES CANNOT BE ACCEPTED.**
5. The RAWF will furnish trays for displaying potatoes, rutabagas and onions, and half bushel baskets for displaying carrots, beets and parsnips. The RAWF will provide standard 12 inch plates for displaying garlic and herbs.
6. Potatoes must be properly identified, thus making it possible to distinguish between table stock and seed potatoes.
7. Onion ropes must measure 3 feet and 6 inches in length and the onions should measure as close to 3 feet as possible. In judging, 40% will be allowed for workmanship and appearance and 60% for quality of the onions.
8. Garlic ropes must measure a minimum of 26 inches from the top of the loop to the bottom of the last garlic. The loops should be 6 inches in length. In judging, 40% will be allowed for workmanship and appearance and 60% for quality of the garlic.
9. In the regular onion classes, an exhibit shall consist of sufficient onions to cover ONLY one layer of a tray 24 inches by 12 inches.
10. In the Rutabaga classes, extra specimens of waxed entries may be submitted. Unwaxed entries should be either brushed or washed.
11. Judging will be conducted on a comparison basis, but when collections are being judged, it is suggested that the judges base their awards on the following criteria:
 - a. Quality as indicated by form, shape, colour, uniformity, condition, and freedom from blemishes.....60 points
 - b. Arrangement.....25 points
 - c. Nomenclature 15 points
12. All exhibits are under the control and subject to the order of the Horticulture Superintendent who may order the disposal of any that are not clean or attractive in appearance. Exhibits that are not sound will be disqualified and may be disposed of prior to judging.
13. Exhibitors must advise the RAWF on the Entry Form of their intention to pick up their entries, or donate them to the Royal. Entries may be removed after Sunday, November 13, 2011, 6:00 pm and before Monday, November 14, 12:00 p.m. after which time they will be discarded.

14. Exhibitors are advised that the RAWF reserves the right to replace or remove any product on display, at the discretion of the Horticulture Superintendent, for the purpose of maintaining an attractive and educational presentation to the public. Disposal of entries is at the discretion of the Superintendent. **EXHIBITORS ARE REQUESTED TO SUBMIT EXTRA PRODUCT FOR DISPLAY RENEWAL, ESPECIALLY CARROTS, PARSNIPS, BEETS, HERBS, CABBAGE AND RUTABAGAS. PLEASE MARK WHICH ARE FOR JUDGING AND WHICH ARE FOR DISPLAY REPLENISHMENT.**
15. Provincial Assistance: Some provinces may offer to pay the costs of shipping for approved entries to the Royal Horticulture Show. Contact your provincial agriculture office for information.

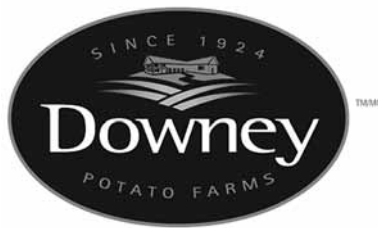

3. Entries will be received on or before Thursday, November 3 at 12:00 p.m.
4. Each exhibit shall consist of five (5) apples, displayed on a plate (plates will be provided). A minimum of fifteen (15) apples are required for each individual variety entry. The best five (5) will be used for the competition.
5. Each exhibit shall be judged based on trueness to varietal characteristics. Entries should be uniform in shape, consistent in size, without defects, and representative of varietal colour. The Canadian Agriculture Products Act Apple Grade Standards should be used as a reference. Both waxed and unwaxed apples are acceptable – this is not a criterion by which the apples will be judged.
6. For the best collection of 5 varieties section; the entrant must supply a basket. There must be 5 different varieties in the collection.
7. For the heaviest apple section; all weights are to be recorded in grams. A specimen must be sound, healthy and undamaged. No foreign material may be included in the weighing and specimens of equal weight will be declared co-winners. Entrants are asked to identify the variety for this class.
8. Section winners will be determined by the exhibitor who achieves the highest point accumulation in that section. Points are awarded as follows:

1st	2nd	3rd	All Other Exhibitors
4	3	2	1
9. The Royal is asking each exhibitor for his earnest co-operation.
10. All exhibits will become the property of the Apple sub-committee of The Royal Agricultural Winter Fair and will be donated to a local food bank at the conclusion of the Fair.

Removal Time: Not before 6:00 p.m. Sunday, November 13. Growers may contact committee members to remove and save seeds from the Giant pumpkins and Squash on the growers' behalf.

Entry Fees: For Class 1 – 20 will be \$3.50 per entry plus tax and administration fee if paid by Monday, October 24, 2011.

Entry Fee for Class 1 – 20 after this date and up to 12:00 p.m. on Saturday, November 6 will be \$5.00 + tax and administration fee.

If a new world record giant vegetable or fruit is officially certified at the RAWF, the RAWF will recognize the exhibitor with an award of \$500.00.

Prize Money:

Classes 1 – 19 1st -\$50 2nd - \$35 3rd - \$25 4th - \$15 5th - \$10

If the 2011 first place weight, length or height is an improvement over the RAWF's 2010 Record, there will be an award of \$50.00 (Classes 1 – 17 only).

Rules and Regulations

1. Subject to the General Rules and Regulations of the RAWF
2. Vines must be trimmed to 1 inch from the stem of fruit.
3. Foreign material may not be included in the weighing. All entries must be cleaned and sound in the opinion of the judge. To enforce this, the judges may x-ray or may open the specimen. Judges have the right to disqualify entries.
4. Foliage can only be included if it forms an integral part of the plant.
5. All roots will be cut cleanly from the main body of the specimen, except where roots are an integral part of the specimen. (i.e. carrot, beet, parsnip, onion)
6. Specimens of equal weight will be declared co-winners.
7. Any vegetable of competitive merit will be properly weighed and judged to Canadian Giant Vegetable Standards.

8. All exhibitors are under the control and subject to the order of the Horticulture Superintendent who may order the removal from the floor display.
9. All Giant Vegetable Growers bringing their entries in are allowed entrance only through the East Loading Dock Door #20, on Saturday November 5th, where they will receive a hand stamp after they show proof of entrance to the competition.

2011 Feature Giant Vegetable – Parsnip root by length, (min 24 inches), washed, no leaves Exhibitors please note: The RAWF Horticulture Show will feature additional prizes for the Features in 2011.

- Class 1** – Beet Root by Weight, washed NO stems or leaves
Class 2 – Cabbage by weight (min. 10 lbs). Root ball and stalk removed at bottom leaves
Class 3 – Corn Stalk by height, (min. 12ft) washed roots (attached to a 1-1/4 inch top rail metal pole for standing up display with clear tape).
Class 4 – Carrot root by length (min 24 inches). Washed, no stems or leaves
Class 5 – Long Gourd, Sicilian Zucchini, Snake, Serpent Gourd stems attached, but not included in length. Length will be determined by a straight line.
Class 6 – Marrow by weight, (min 12lbs) stems included
Class 7 – Onion bulbs by weight, leaves trimmed at 5 inches
Class 8 – Parsnip root by length, (min 24 inches), washed, no leaves
Class 9 – Parsnip root by weight, clean, no leaves
Class 10 – Potato by weight, clean
Class 11 – Sunflower stalk by height (min. 12ft), washed roots (attached to 1-1/4 inch top rail metal pole for display with clear tape)
Class 12 – Sunflower head by diameter including 5ft of stalk. Heads must be strictly sound and NOT wet and include 75% of the seeds ** Sunflower heads are allowed to be hooded except for during judging.
Class 13 – Watermelons by weight, stem attached
Class 14 – Kale (Flowering Kale) or Collard by height (Grown in a min. 18 inch container) No Transplants
Class 15 – Ornamental/Flowering Cabbage by diameter (Grown in a min. 18 inch container) No Transplants
Class 16 – Kohlrabi by weight, trimmed with no stems, roots or leaves.
Class 17 – Amaranth by height, washed clean, no roots. Measured in a straight line from base of the plant to the top of centre of vegetative growth. Min. 5ft
Class 18 – Any other Giant Vegetable or Fruit of Competitive merit (In respect to a world record)
Class 19 – Any other named living Giant Vegetable of competitive merit (Grown in a min. 18 inch container) No Transplants, no Fodders
